Architectural Styles

Baja Contemporary

This style embraces a regionally appropriate coastal contemporary design, utilizing local or uniquely distinctive materials and construction methods with contemporary details. The clean, refined lines create an artful contrast to the sinuous natural landscape. Notable features include overlapping flat roofs with parapets or cantilevered forms, providing deeply shaded, welcoming spaces, and expansive windows and doors for significant indoor/outdoor connectivity. This style offers a simple yet elegant appearance, ideal for a casual and comfortable coastal lifestyle focused on relaxation and entertainment. Courtyard areas, often featuring pools or water elements, offer additional shelter and shade, creating a microclimate. Richly textured materials, including stone, stucco, masonry, or wood, are encouraged, often with distinctive patterns.

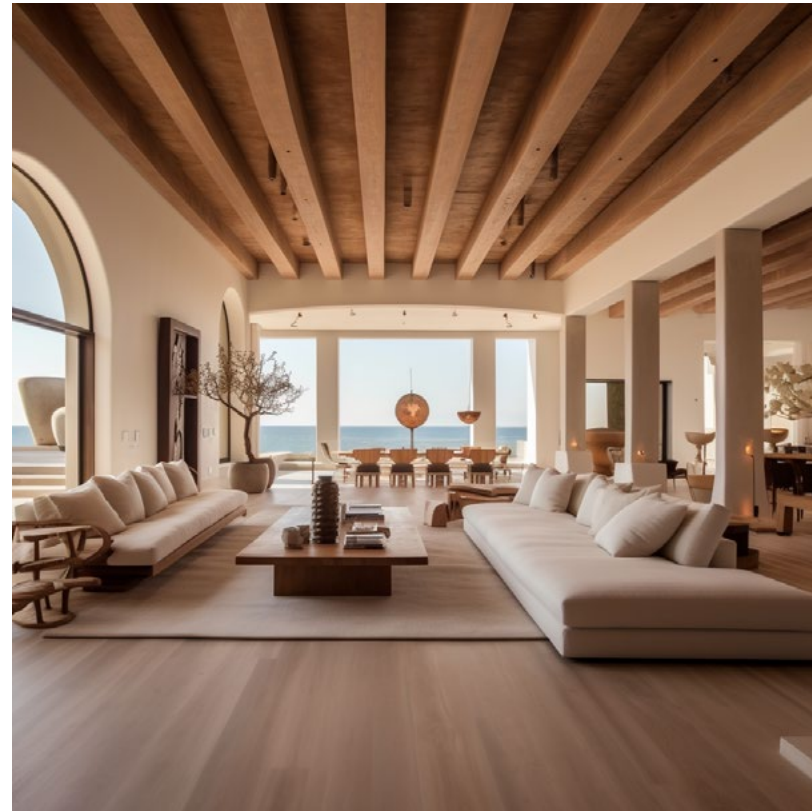

Mexican Heritage

Derived from classic Spanish or Mexican Hacienda, Spanish Mission, or Spanish Colonial Revival styles, this architectural style adopts traditional materials, forms, and design details as seen in Mexico.

Key features include arch forms, arcaded walkways, courtyards, and sculpted forms. Ornate stone detailing may adorn columns, pilasters, and trim around windows and doors. Traditional fenestration includes divided lite windows and doors with both vertical and horizontal divisions. Exterior materials typically include full or partial stucco, stone or brick, and two-piece clay tiles or flat parapet roofs.

This style draws inspiration from Spanish and Mexican Hacienda, Spanish Mission, or Spanish Colonial Revival architecture, with modern interpretations in materials, forms, and design details. While retaining some traditional features such as arch forms, arcaded walkways, and courtyards, it accentuates proportions for a contemporary flair. Stone detailing is less ornate, emphasizing clean lines. Fenestration tends towards less traditional divisions, often horizontal or without divided lites. Exterior materials include full or partial stucco, stone, brick, or other masonry forms in unique patterns, with flat roof tiles or flat parapet roofs.

Baja Organic

This style epitomizes regionally relevant organic architecture, utilizing locally sourced materials and traditional construction methods. Each residence is often an ensemble of structures centered around the main palapa—a covered outdoor central gathering space. The individual structures, whether curvilinear or rectilinear, are typically grouped in clusters around the palapa or courtyard areas. Renowned for its laid-back, casual ambiance, this style emphasizes extensive connectivity to the outdoors, often characterized by open-air designs, though features for semi-enclosure are available to provide protection from wind or rain. Exterior materials range from organically laid stone to stucco and other traditional masonry forms.

Modern Baja Organic

This style represents a contemporary evolution of the Baja Organic style, integrating uniquely distinctive materials with modern construction methods and design elements. Structures, which can be curvilinear but more often rectilinear, are typically organized in clusters around a central palapa or courtyard. The materials and details showcase a modern character while maintaining a laid-back ambiance. Despite a more structured appearance, the design still emphasizes a strong connection to the outdoors, often featuring open-air elements with options for semi-enclosure. Exterior materials range from more organized stone layouts to stucco and other masonry forms with unique patterns and textures.

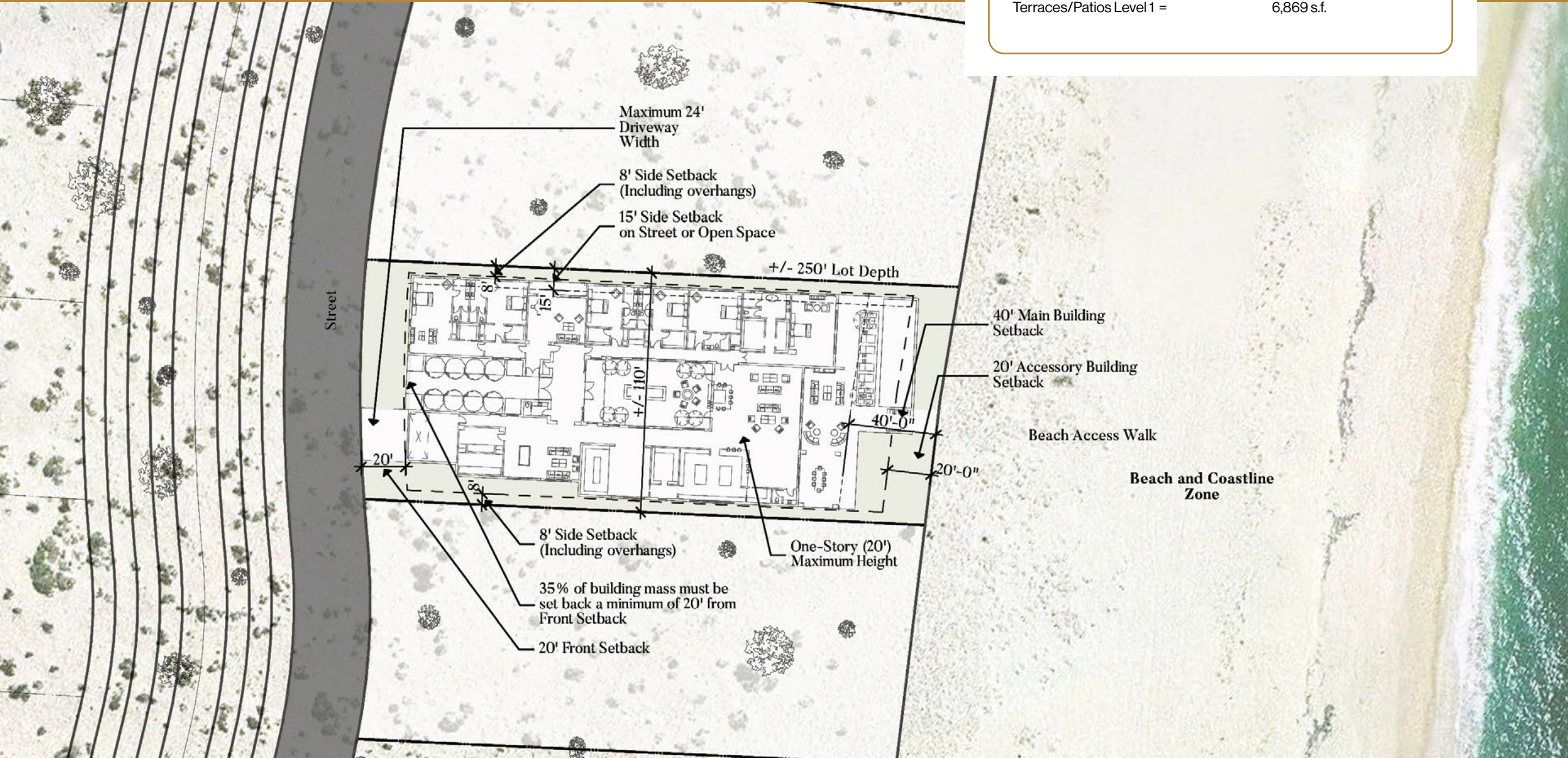

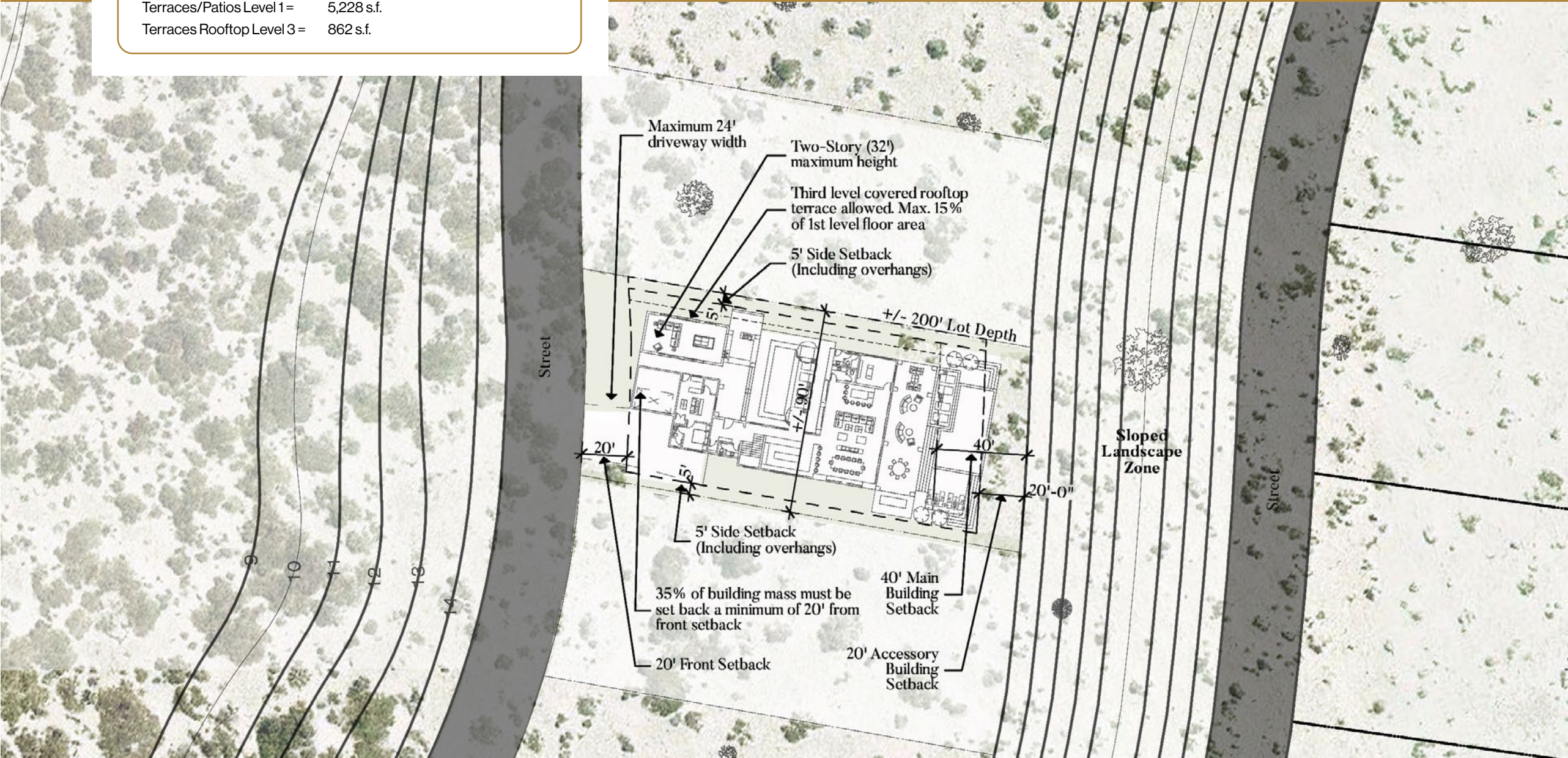
